Migration is in full flow. First of the season (FOS) Northern Pintail ducks were seen at American Canyon Wetlands on Monday. A FOS Yellow-rumped Warbler was seen at Benicia Community Park on Wednesday. And on Wednesday morning we saw the first flight of fall geese heading east over Benicia on their way to their winter home in the Central Valley. It's an exciting time of the year to be a birder!

 - c. The September Field Trip was to Martinez. We explored some new areas that I had not previously birded. The highlight of the trip was the view from the ridge high above Martinez with a wonderful panorama of the Carquinez Strait and delta region beyond. We were entertained by stilling Red-tailed Hawks and hunting Kestrels flying along the top of the ridge.

d. The Weekly Walk for September 25 was moved to American Canyon Wetlands, and we had 20+ participants who observed 53 species during the morning walk. We did miss the Northern Pintails that showed up the following Monday, however there were plenty of ducks and shorebirds to be seen along with a good variety of raptors. And the Soras, Common Gallinules, and the Pied-billed Grebe all came out to entertain their audience. Doug Matacio shared the following picture he took while on the walk.
