Hello NSAS friends and members –

It has been a while since the last issue of Birding Notes. My excuses for the delay were that I participated in the NSAS Monterey Field trip, and I've been taking care of some other issues. I went to Monterey a couple of days early to see if I could see a Condor and on my second day of standing and waiting and watching one flew in, circled overhead, and was kind enough to land on a rock ~ 75 yards up the cliff from where I was standing. It was truly wonderful!!

Note #1 - NSAS announcements

1. Our November Members Meetings will be Zoom event on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>November 11th</u>. At this meeting author and artist <u>Keith Hansen</u> will present "Birds of the Sierra Nevada." Keith recently published the definitive field guide for the identification of Sierra Nevada birds. 2. Field Trips:

Our <u>Saturday Weekly Bird Walks with Andrew</u> are continuing throughout October and November. The most recent walks were on October 23 at the American Canyon Wetlands and on October 30 at Lynch Canyon. Betty (Mo) Mosher reported "I went on Andrew's walk at AmCan this morning and it was VERY birdy." Reports for the Lynch Canyon trip were that it started out slow with cloudy, drizzly weather but then the sun and the birds came out a little later in the morning. The highlight was the 3 Golden Eagles, two adults and a juvenile that gave the group a good viewing.

 <u>The Saturday Weekly Bird Walk with Andrew</u> on October 9 was at Newell Canyon. Patti Heidl was kind enough to write this summary of the day's birding adventure.

Did I say it was a "Bluebird Day"? Why yes, they were abundant, as were the Meadow Larks and many other species. Newell Canyon did not disappoint the 15 congenial birders that followed Andrew over an arid, autumnal landscape. Red-tailed Hawks, American Kestrels, and White-tailed Kites soared overhead providing great looks to compare sexes and ages. A pair of Golden Eagles posed for us atop a transmission tower brought into closer view thanks to Terry's generous sharing of his scope. Even a Chinese Praying Mantis flew in to delight us! We kept our eyes open for another variety of bird; however, no one sighted the "Blue Angels." Why did the coyote trot away? Join us for the next bird walk and find out. It was a fine day!

Our <u>October Monthly Field Trip</u> was a visit to the <u>Monterey Bay area on October 16 - 17</u>. - 3. Last Thursday I was working in my garage on a project to build twelve new Bluebird Nesting Boxes that will be installed at locations in the City of American Canyon. My work was interrupted by the sound of honking, so I wandered into the front yard and was able to spot the "V" formation of a flight of ~ 75 geese heading east towards the Central Valley which hopefully will be the end point of their fall migration. It gave me <u>JOY</u> to hear and see these majestic birds and imagine a time (maybe 150 years ago) when the fall skies would have been full of flights of these honking migrating geese.

Note #3 – Fight against Climate Change

- 1. I happened to read an article titled "East Bay levee breached after 100-year closure in effort to restore rare wildlife to marshland." It describes a long running project that has finally been implemented to re-open the Pacheco Marsh which is located near Martinez. This is a marsh that's been dormant for nearly 100 years and its reopening is part of a larger effort to restore a habitat that's becoming increasingly rare in the Bay Area. The plan for this marsh land includes three miles of walking trails and a visitor's center, all set for completion in 2023.
