Happy Holidays! Hope you had a restful, relaxing, and very birdy Thanksgiving! I wish my holidays could have been more birdy. A month ago, I headed to the hospital for knee replacement surgery and since then I've been homebound. Lots of sparrows and finches at my back yard feeder, but I missed having a chance to see the Bald Eagle that was at the American Canyon Wetlands last Monday or the hundreds of Wigeons that were at Lake Herman on Wednesday. Somehow WCSPs and HOFIs are just not as impressive as seeing an Eagle or a large flock of ducks.

Note #2 – The Joy of Birds –

- 2. Want to put names to bird species you might see? This Audubon website will help you to get to know 20 of the most common bird species from across North America. It is a quick way to learn about birds that will be common in our location and in other locations across the country. <u>Can you easily ID all these species?</u> Check them out at https://www.audubon.org/news/get-know-these-20-common-birds.
- 3. Audubon CA reports that at this time of year, <u>Sandhill Cranes are arriving</u> to spend the winter in protected wetlands and surrounding agricultural lands in the Central Valley after their long migrations from places as far away as Siberia or Alaska. They describe viewing Sandhill Cranes as "nothing short of a magical experience" and I would have to agree. They have recommended these *4 locations as the top spots see these spectacular birds*. These locations are a short drive from a Napa or Solano location, and it is well worth the time to take a birding day to see the cranes. Be sure to arrive at dawn or wait till dusk to watch and hear the fly out / fly in of these special birds.
 - a. <u>Merced National Wildlife Refuge</u> hosts the largest wintering concentration of Lesser Sandhill Cranes in the Pacific Flyway.
 - b. <u>Staten Island</u> has been a wintering destination for Sandhill Cranes for more than 40 years. The Nature Conservancy protects the island as a place for wildlife-friendly agriculture. The best time to see cranes here is at sunset as they return to their roost sites on the island.
 - c. <u>Pixley National Wildlife Refuge</u> The foot trail at Pixley NWR is open from sunrise to sunset. The observation deck at the end of the foot trail is the best vantage point to view large numbers of Sandhill Cranes as they fly off and onto the refuge. Bring a flashlight, sturdy comfortable shoes, and layers.
 - d. <u>Cosumnes River Preserve</u> The best chance to see the cranes is during the day while they feed on the fields. A good day of birding can include the day at Cosumnes looking at the Cranes, Geese, and water fowl, followed by a short trip to Staten Island around 4 PM to watch the Cranes and Geese fly in for the evening. It is special experience to see and hear flight after flight of 100's of Cranes, Geese, and Swans all descending on Staten Island as the sun is setting in the west.

4. Mark Stephenson thought you would be interested in this Audubon story about Bar-tailed Godwits. It details the GPS tracking efforts underway to discover the details of these Godwit's travels. One bird being monitored flew 8,100 miles in transit from Alaska to New Zeeland — *flapping its wings* nonstop for 239 hours without rest, setting the world record for the longest continual flight by any land bird by distance.
